WHAT IS A VOLUNTEER?

As you know, West Gippsland Community Radio (3BBR FM) is staffed and run entirely by volunteers. What exactly does it mean to be a volunteer at a Community Radio Station?

Volunteer Presenters spend many hours preparing their programs before you even get to hear them on the radio waves. They carefully choose the music they'll be playing and they also find interesting information to share with you. This can be in the form of jokes, trivia, or spoken content for an informative program. All of this takes time, which they give for free.

Presenting is not the only area that requires volunteers. We have a dedicated and experienced team of volunteer technicians, handymen, housekeepers, producers, interviewers, sponsorship specialists, salesmen, admin staff, PR people, Board Members and more. Everyone at 3BBR FM is giving, literally, hours of their time to Listening Land every week, for free...or is it?

As a presenter myself, I can say that the station has given me at least as much as I have given it, if not more. It's given me an opportunity to share the music I love, to be on radio, to talk about health and wellbeing and, above all, a sense of purpose and usefulness. VALE- IAN WILKINS (LEVENE)

1952-2018



We recently lost one of our valued presenters, Ian Wilkins (Levene). Ian was born in Birmingham, U.K. in 1952 and emigrated to Perth WA in 1982. He met his wife Yvonne in 1993 and they relocated to Melbourne to be closer to her family. They married in 2001.

They built a home in Drouin and Ian decided to become involved as a Presenter, with the local Community Radio Station (3BBR FM).

Ian was passionate about music and spent many happy hours preparing his playlists before his programs every week. His favourites were hits from the 60's, 70's and 80's and he loved Motown and Soul music.

Ian and Yvonne moved to Willow Grove and barely a year later, in August 2018, Ian was diagnosed with terminal cancer. He came to accept the outcome of his illness and died peacefully with his wife and family around him, on 12th November 2018.

We will miss his 'Lost & Found' program and the other great shows he presented. His music knowledge was amazing and his memory lives on in every one of his music tracks that various presenters are playing.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Happy New Year One and All.

Since the AGM I've been out and about, visiting other Community Radio Stations to see what they do, why and how they do it and also to see which ideas we could adopt to make our station even better. As a part of this exercise, I also noted the things that other stations do that may not be right for 3BBR FM.



I'd like to share with you what I observed at the other stations. Please note, it is ***what I observed***, not necessarily what will be adopted at 3BBR FM.

Visit to 3MDR-Upwey-Minimum of 12hrs volunteering required aside from presenting, per year;

Regular presenter meetings-must turn up to at least 50% of them to stay on air;

Involved with wide section of community, schools, ethnic groups, etc;

Use work experience children for various jobs;

Livestream the archives so people can catch up;

Sell merchandise from their online store on their website;

Record local musicians and offer the CD's for sale

Presenters choose own music;

CSA's and sponsor announcements are on the computer.

Visit to 3MFM-Inverloch- Offered to do our CSA's and sponsor announcements for free, via their professional voice-over business;

Very automated;

Presenters do not choose their own music, music is chosen by one man;

Music from 70's is featured as golden oldies, nothing older played during the week between 7am and 6pm;

Different news service which is cheaper and sounds better than ours;

They talk about personalities, not programmes;

CSA's and sponsor announcements are on the computer.

Visit to Gippsland FM- Morwell – Multiple presenters for breakfast programs;
Interaction/banter between presenters finishing and those coming in for the next show;
Read excerpts from local paper;
Lots of phone calls on the brekky show;
Presenters choose their own music;
CSA's and sponsor announcements are on the computer.
